IMPORTANT DISCLAIMER

This report presents objective forensic data findings derived from machine-generated metadata embedded within official court documents served by the Minnesota Court Records Online (MCRO) system. Every finding is independently reproducible by querying the source database or by opening the hyperlinked source PDFs and examining their XMP metadata properties.

This report documents a **logical impossibility**: documents whose internal creation timestamps predate the release of the software version stamped in their own metadata. A document cannot be created by software that does not yet exist. The term “fabricated creation date” is used as the only accurate technical description of this condition — it is a factual conclusion, not an accusation of intent or motive.

This report does not assert conclusions about guilt, intent, or motive. Each finding is a documented anomaly that warrants independent expert examination. The underlying database, along with its OpenTimestamps (OTS) Bitcoin blockchain anchoring and MITMPROXY session recordings, constitutes a contemporaneous evidence chain for the data collection process.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- **27 documents in the MCRO corpus were produced by Aspose.Words for .NET 14.2.0.0, a commercial PDF rendering library released in February 2014.**
- **7 of these 27 documents carry XMP creation dates before February 2014 — before the software that created them existed. This is a logical impossibility: these creation dates are provably fabricated.**
- **The earliest fabricated creation date is August 14, 2013, 5 months and 18 days before Aspose.Words 14.2.0.0 was released.**
- 17 documents (63% of the cohort) share an identical creation timestamp of February 26, 2019 at 15:05 UTC, despite being filed for 14 different defendants across a span of 1,056 days (2.9 years). This is a “frozen fabrication clock”: a single pre-built document reused with only defendant-specific fields changed.
- All 17 frozen-timestamp documents are “Notice of Intent to Prosecute” filings — a document type that names a specific defendant and represents a prosecutorial decision about a specific person.
- 22 of 22 Aspose defendants (100%) also appear in at least one other forensic anomaly dimension (ESolutions signatures, incompetency orders, IronPDF generation, or elevated Rule 20 events).
- 14 of 22 defendants (63.6%) have ESolutions digital signature records. 14 of 22 (63.6%) have Finding of Incompetency orders.
- The maximum gap between a fabricated creation date and official filing date is 4,404 days (12.1 years) — Travis McGIRL’s dismissal, carrying a September 2013 creation date, was filed September 30, 2025.
- Aspose.Words for .NET accounts for only 27 of 4,251 documents (0.6% of the corpus) but is 100% concentrated in defendants who appear across multiple independent forensic dimensions.
- This finding escalates beyond the IronPDF finding in the Initial Forensic Analysis Report. IronPDF proved documents were generated at download time (a temporal gap). Aspose proves creation dates are fabricated (a logical impossibility).

TECHNICAL BACKGROUND

What Is the XMP Producer Field?

Every PDF file contains an internal metadata structure called XMP (Extensible Metadata Platform). One of the standard XMP fields is the **Producer** — a machine-generated string that identifies the software library that rendered the PDF's internal page content. Unlike the Author or Title fields (which can be freely edited by a user), the Producer field is set automatically by the rendering engine at the moment the PDF is generated. It is not a user-editable field in any standard workflow.

What Is Aspose.Words for .NET?

Aspose.Words for .NET is a commercial document processing library sold by Aspose Pty Ltd. It allows software developers to programmatically create, modify, and convert documents — including rendering Word documents to PDF format. When Aspose.Words renders a document to PDF, it stamps its own identity and version number into the XMP Producer field. This stamp is automatic and cannot be suppressed or overridden through normal Aspose API usage.

How Version Numbering Works

Aspose.Words for .NET follows a deterministic **YY.M** versioning scheme, where the first number represents the year and the second represents the month of release:

Version 14.1.0.0 = January 2014 release

Version 14.2.0.0 = February 2014 release

Version 14.3.0.0 = March 2014 release

The version string “14.2.0.0” therefore means the second release of 2014 — i.e., February 2014. This convention is documented in Aspose’s public release notes archive and is deterministic: the version number unambiguously identifies when the software was released.

Why This Constitutes Proof of Fabrication

When a PDF’s XMP Producer field contains “Aspose.Words for .NET 14.2.0.0” and its XMP Creation Date is August 14, 2013, this means the document claims to have been created by software that would not exist for another 5 months and 18 days. This is not a statistical anomaly or an interpretive inference — it is a **logical impossibility**. The creation date is therefore provably fabricated, because:

1. The Producer field is machine-generated at render time — it cannot be backdated independently of the creation timestamp without modifying the PDF’s binary structure.
2. The version number is embedded by the software itself — the software identifies itself. A document cannot self-report being created by version 14.2.0.0 if that version does not yet exist.
3. The XMP Creation Date and the Producer version are set in the same atomic operation. If the Producer says 14.2.0.0, the creation date must be on or after February 2014.

How This Differs from the IronPDF Finding

The Initial Forensic Analysis Report (Finding 1) documented 5 IronPDF-generated documents whose creation timestamps matched their download dates — proving they were generated at retrieval time rather than served from an archive. That finding demonstrated a **temporal gap** (creation date ≠ filing date). The Aspose finding documented here is qualitatively different: it demonstrates a **logical impossibility** (creation date precedes the software’s existence). IronPDF requires interpretation; Aspose requires only arithmetic.

METHODS

All analyses were performed against the live PostgreSQL forensic database (Supabase project `ibfmjtwahkwqzcmeyqii`, region `us-west-2`) using read-only SELECT queries. The primary table used was **children** (4,251 rows, one per PDF), filtered by `metadata__xmp_producer ILIKE '%Aspose%'` to isolate the Aspose cohort (27 documents).

Frozen timestamp clusters were identified by grouping on `date_trunc('minute', metadata__xmp_create_date)` and selecting groups with 2 or more documents sharing an identical creation timestamp.

Cross-dimensional overlap was assessed by joining the Aspose cohort’s `cluster_ids` against the **children_signatures_full_report** table (for ESolutions signatures), the **children** table filtered on `filing_type ILIKE '%Finding of Incompetency%'` (for incompetency orders), and the **children** table filtered on `metadata__xmp_creator_tool ILIKE '%IronPdf%'` (for IronPDF overlap). Rule 20 event counts were derived from **parents_case_events** using the standard Rule 20 regex filter.

The Aspose.Words version release date was established from Aspose’s public release notes archive and their documented YY.M versioning convention. All SQL queries are reproduced in the Appendix.

FINDINGS

Finding 1: Complete Aspose Document Census

Background

The XMP Producer field in every PDF in the MCRO corpus was examined. Of 4,251 documents and 117 distinct producer values, 27 documents (0.6%) carry a producer string containing “Aspose.Words for .NET 14.2.0.0.” All 27 share an identical producer string: *Aspose.Words for .NET 14.2.0.0; modified using iText® 7.1.16 ©2000-2021 iText Group NV (Minnesota Judicial Branch; licensed version)*. The iText suffix is the MCRO e-filing pipeline's watermark layer, appended at download time. The Aspose portion identifies the original PDF rendering engine (see Appendix A1, A9).

Findings

The complete Aspose cohort comprises 27 documents spanning 25 distinct case numbers, 22 distinct defendants, and 6 filing types. Filing dates range from October 9, 2018 to September 30, 2025 (a span of 2,548 days / 7.0 years). XMP creation dates range from August 14, 2013 to February 26, 2019. The gap between creation date and filing date ranges from 777 to 4,404 days (2.1 to 12.1 years), with a median of 1,479 days (4.1 years).

Figure 1: Aspose Document Timeline — Creation Date vs. Filing Date

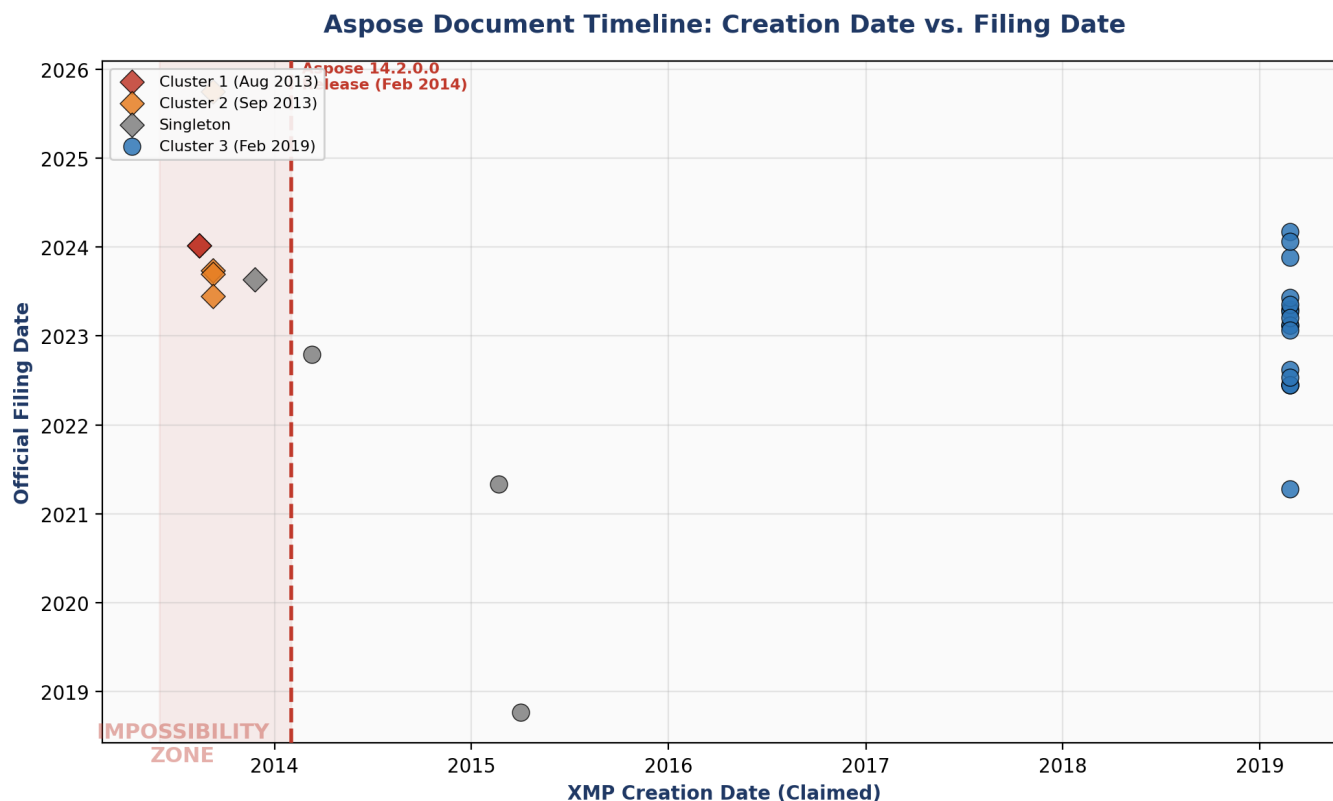

Significance

Aspose.Words for .NET is a specialized commercial software library. Its presence in 0.6% of the MCRO corpus indicates it is not part of the standard court document production pipeline (which is dominated by Microsoft Word for Microsoft 365, GdPicture.NET, and Acrobat Distiller). The Aspose cohort represents a distinct, non-standard document generation pathway affecting a small but forensically significant population of defendants.

Finding 2: Software Version Temporal Impossibility — The Pre-Release Documents

Background

Aspose.Words for .NET 14.2.0.0 was released in February 2014. Any document carrying this version identifier in its XMP Producer field with a creation date before February 2014 presents a logical impossibility: the document claims to have been created by software that had not yet been released. This section isolates and catalogs every such document (see Appendix A3).

Findings

7 documents carry XMP creation dates that predate the Aspose 14.2.0.0 release. These fall into three distinct timestamp settings:

Timestamp Setting 1 (August 14, 2013 20:45 UTC): 2 documents for PRIEST JESUS, both in case 27-CR-22-4239, filed January 8–9, 2024. Creation date precedes software release by **171 days**.

Timestamp Setting 2 (September 9, 2013 13:50 UTC): 4 documents for 4 different defendants (MARVAL BARNES, ABDINOUR ALASOW, CASPER VUONG, Travis McGIRL), filed across 3 different case numbers between June 2023 and September 2025. Creation date precedes software release by **145 days**. The most extreme gap is Travis McGIRL's dismissal: 4,404 days (12.1 years) between the fabricated creation date and the filing date.

Timestamp Setting 3 (November 25, 2013 20:57 UTC): 1 document for RASHEED RICHARDSON, case 27-CR-20-26577, filed August 22, 2023. Creation date precedes software release by **68 days**. Richardson also appears in the IronPDF cohort from the Initial Forensic Analysis Report.

Significance

These 7 documents constitute the strongest category of metadata evidence in the corpus. No alternative explanation — template reuse, timezone error, clock drift, archival migration, or software

misconfiguration — can produce a creation date that predates the software's existence by months. The version number is embedded by the software itself; the software did not exist on the dates claimed.

Connecting Context

The 7 pre-release documents affect 6 distinct defendants. Of these, RASHEED RICHARDSON also appears in the IronPDF cohort (Initial Forensic Analysis Report, Finding 1) with a “Returned Mail” document generated at download time. MARVAL BARNES and Travis McGIRL also appear in the Frozen Timestamp Cluster 2 (4 defendants sharing an identical September 2013 creation timestamp across different cases and filing years).

Finding 3: Frozen Fabrication Clock — Identical Timestamps Across Years

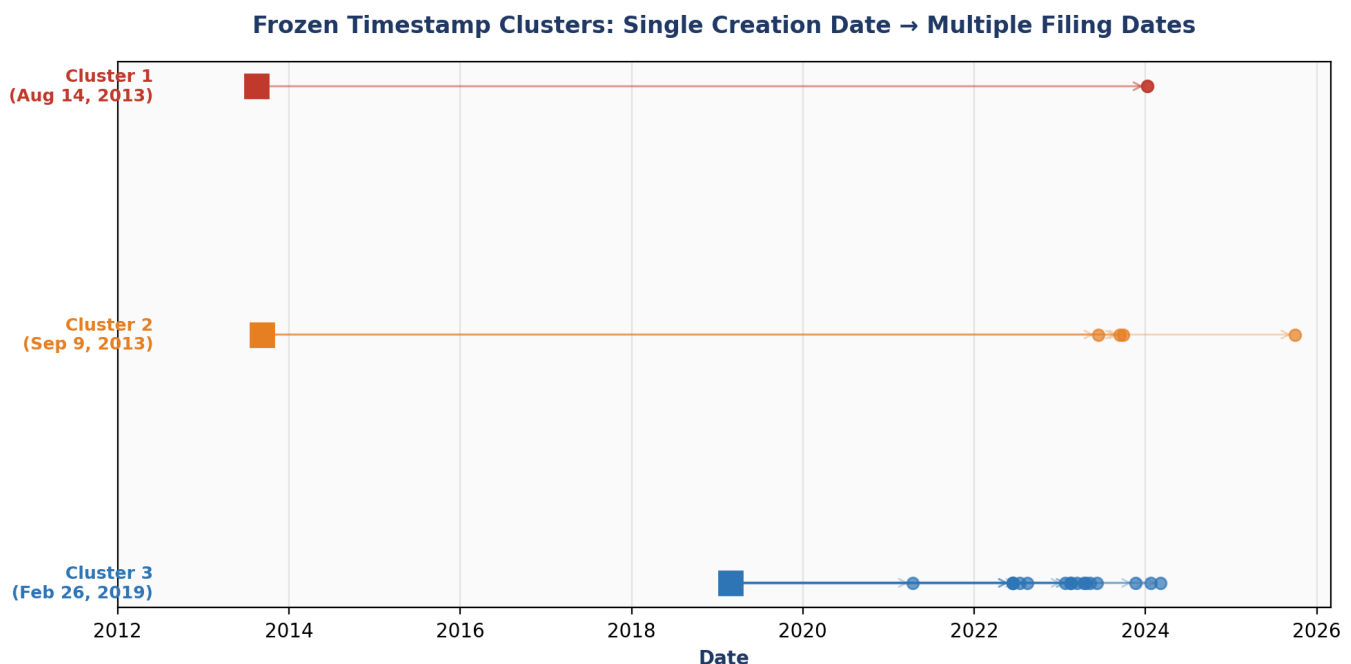
Background

When a document template is used normally, each new document receives a fresh creation timestamp reflecting the moment the template was opened or rendered. Documents produced from the same template on different dates will therefore have different creation timestamps. When multiple documents filed over a span of years for different defendants carry the **exact same creation timestamp to the minute**, the timestamp was not generated by normal template use — it was frozen in a pre-built document that was reused with only defendant-specific fields changed (see Appendix A4).

Findings

Three distinct frozen timestamp clusters were identified:

Figure 2: Frozen Timestamp Clusters — Single Creation Date to Multiple Filing Dates



Cluster 3 (February 26, 2019, 15:05 UTC) — The Dominant Cluster:

17 documents for **14 different defendants** share this identical creation timestamp. Filing dates span from April 13, 2021 to March 4, 2024 — a range of **1,056 days (2.9 years)**. Every document in this cluster is a “Notice of Intent to Prosecute.”

Notable: ISAAC KELLEY has three Aspose-fabricated notices across three different case numbers (27-CR-21-20529, 27-CR-22-5532, 27-CR-22-7953), all filed on the same day (June 13, 2022). This is a single-day multi-case batch filing with frozen timestamps.

Notable: DENNIS BARRY has two notices across two different case numbers (27-CR-22-22521, 27-CR-22-3570), both filed on the same day (February 15, 2023). Barry is also the #1 raw ESolutions document count defendant in the ESolutions Signature Statistical Breakdown report (11 documents, 27 signature records across 3 cases).

Significance

A “Notice of Intent to Prosecute” is not a generic form — it names a specific defendant and represents a prosecutorial decision about a specific person. Finding 17 such documents for 14 different people carrying an identical creation timestamp to the minute, filed over a span of nearly 3 years, demonstrates that these documents were not individually authored. A single pre-built document was reused with only defendant-specific fields changed, and the creation timestamp was never updated.

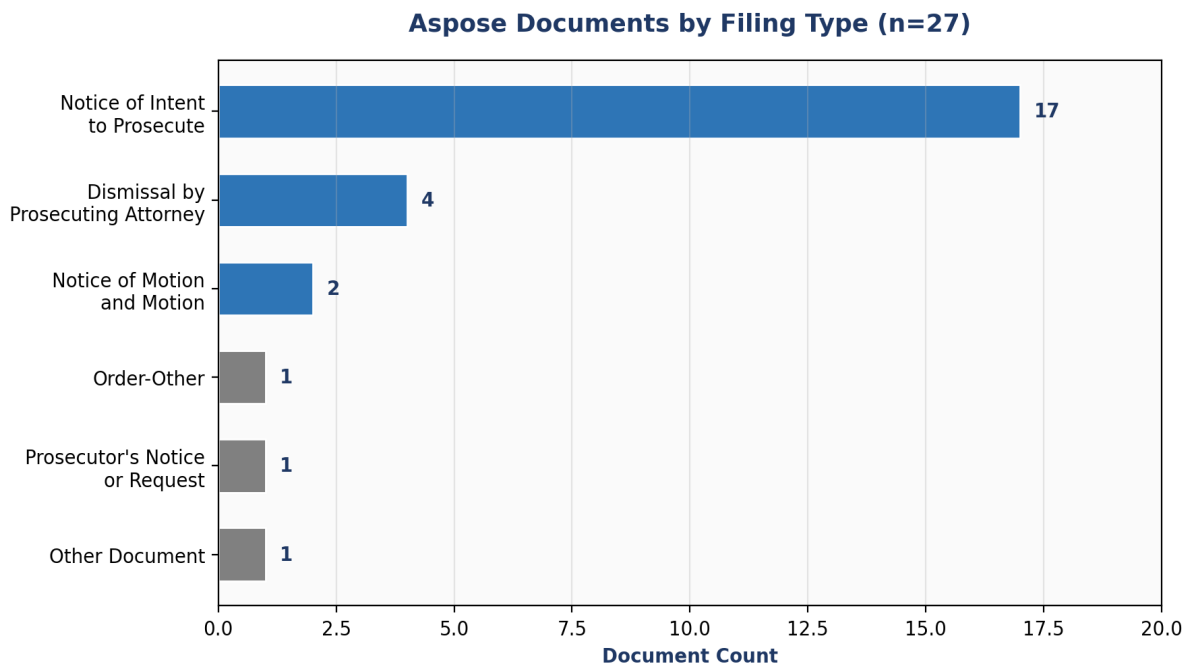
Finding 4: Filing Type Concentration — “Notice of Intent to Prosecute”

Background

This analysis breaks down the Aspose cohort by document filing type to determine whether the fabricated-timestamp pattern is concentrated in specific document categories (see Appendix A5).

Findings

Significance

“Notice of Intent to Prosecute” accounts for 17 of 27 Aspose documents (63.0%). This filing type represents a prosecutorial decision to proceed against a specific defendant and must be individually created per case. The concentration of fabricated timestamps in prosecutorial filings — rather than in generic court forms or administrative documents — is a forensic signal that warrants independent investigation.

Finding 5: Cross-Dimensional Defendant Overlap

Background

This analysis checks whether the defendants appearing in the Aspose cohort also appear in other forensic anomaly populations identified in prior reports: ESolutions signature outliers, Finding of Incompetency orders, IronPDF-generated documents, and elevated Rule 20 competency event counts (see Appendix A6).

22 of 22 Aspose defendants (100%) appear in at least one additional forensic anomaly dimension beyond the Aspose finding itself. **14 of 22** (63.6%) have ESolutions digital signature records. **14 of 22** (63.6%) have Finding of Incompetency orders. **16 of 22** (72.7%) have 9 or more Rule 20 competency events per case. The median cross-dimensional presence is 3 of 5 dimensions.

Significance

If the Aspose cohort were a random sample of 22 defendants from the corpus, the probability that every single one would also appear in at least one other forensic anomaly population would be extremely low. The 100% overlap rate indicates that the Aspose-fabricated documents are concentrated in the same defendant population that exhibits anomalies across every other forensic dimension examined to date.

Finding 6: Escalation Beyond IronPDF — From Temporal Gap to Logical Impossibility

Background

The Initial Forensic Analysis Report (Finding 1) documented 5 IronPDF-generated documents where creation timestamps matched download dates. The Capstone Convergence Target Report (Section 5E) framed this as “Temporal Impossibility at Scale.” This analysis explicitly compares the two findings to establish the escalation in evidentiary weight (see Appendix A7).

Significance

IronPDF proves the system can generate backdated documents. Aspose proves the creation dates themselves are fabricated. IronPDF is a temporal gap. Aspose is a logical impossibility. IronPDF requires interpretation. Aspose requires only arithmetic. The Aspose finding therefore represents a qualitative escalation in evidentiary weight: from “something is wrong with the timestamps” to “the timestamps are provably false.”

Rasheed Richardson appears in both populations — his case contains both an IronPDF-generated document (created at download time) and an Aspose document with a pre-release fabricated creation date. This makes Richardson’s case a convergence point for two independent categories of metadata fabrication evidence.

Finding 7: Defendant Deep-Dives — The Recurring Outliers

Background

The following profiles detail the 5 defendants with the highest cross-dimensional presence in the Aspose cohort (see Appendix A8).

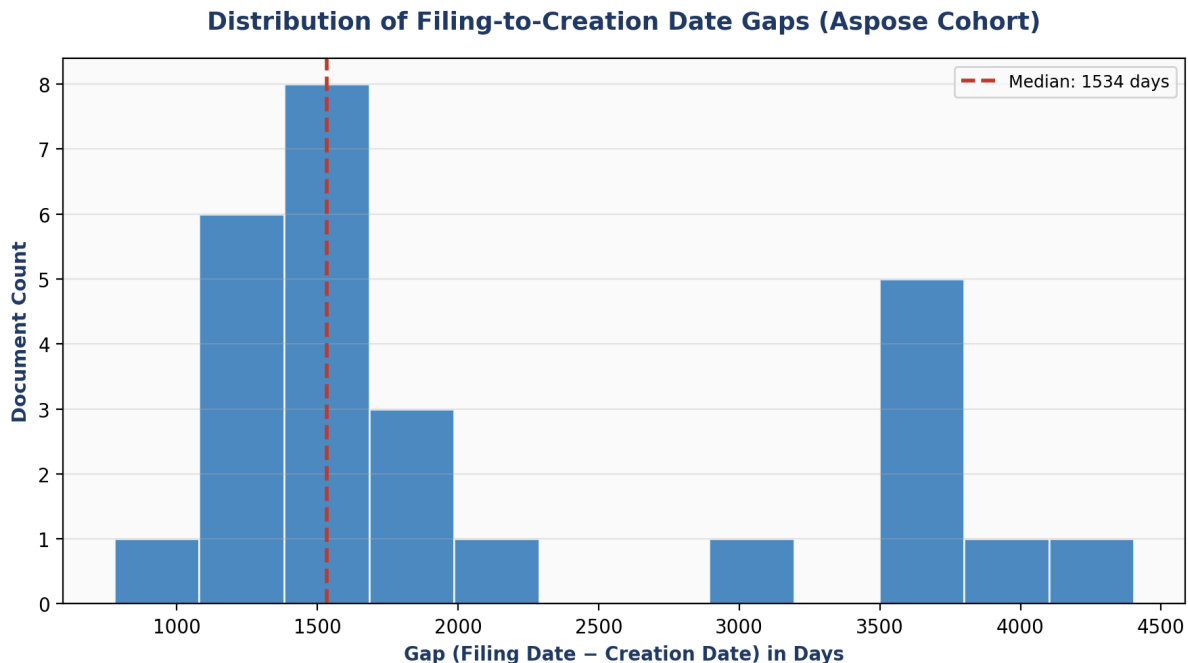

LIMITATIONS & ALTERNATIVE EXPLANATIONS

- **Corpus scope:** The MCRO forensic database contains 4,251 PDFs across 245 cases in the Fourth Judicial District. This represents a subset of all court filings. The Aspose cohort (27 documents) is small in absolute terms, though its findings are individually conclusive at the document level.
- **Software release date precision:** The Aspose 14.2.0.0 release date is established as February 2014 based on the documented YY.M versioning convention and public release notes. The exact day within February is not material to the impossibility finding, as all 7 pre-release documents carry creation dates in August–November 2013, months before any February 2014 date.
- **Template reuse vs. document reuse:** The frozen-timestamp pattern (17 documents sharing an identical creation timestamp) could theoretically result from distributing a pre-built PDF form that is filled in without re-rendering. However, this would still mean the creation date displayed in document properties does not reflect when the document was created for the named defendant.
- **Metadata modification:** It is theoretically possible to modify XMP metadata after PDF creation using specialized tools. However, this would require deliberate post-processing, and the consistency of the Aspose version string across all 27 documents (including the iText pipeline suffix) argues against ad-hoc modification.
- **iText pipeline interaction:** All 27 documents carry the iText "Minnesota Judicial Branch" watermark suffix in the Producer field, indicating they passed through the standard MCRO e-filing pipeline. The Aspose version string precedes the iText suffix, consistent with Aspose being the original rendering engine and iText being the subsequent watermark layer.

- Database completeness: Not all cases in the MCRO system are represented in this database. Defendants appearing in few forensic dimensions may have additional relevant filings in cases not captured by the collection methodology.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR INDEPENDENT VERIFICATION

1. Open any hyperlinked PDF: Right-click → Properties → examine the XMP metadata fields. Confirm the Producer field contains "Aspose.Words for .NET 14.2.0.0" and the Creation Date matches the values stated in this report.
2. Verify the Aspose version release date: Visit Aspose's public release notes archive and confirm that version 14.2.0.0 corresponds to the February 2014 release.
3. Reproduce the frozen timestamp analysis: Open any two of the 17 "Notice of Intent to Prosecute" documents from the Cluster 3 table above. Verify they share an identical XMP Creation Date of February 26, 2019 15:05 UTC despite being filed for different defendants on different dates.
4. Request original documents: Obtain the original versions of these 27 documents from the court's internal document management system (Tyler Technologies Odyssey). Compare their internal metadata against the MCRO-served versions.
5. Engage a credentialed digital forensics examiner (CFCE, EnCE, or equivalent) to independently verify the key findings before use in formal legal proceedings.
6. SQL reproducibility: All queries used in this report are provided in the Appendix. Any party with read access to the MCRO forensic database can reproduce every finding independently.
